PHIL 100 Basic Problems in Philosophy

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Course Description: This class is a broad introduction to philosophy, both its concepts and its methods. Toward this end, we will look at some major philosophical texts, examining their arguments concerning some basic problems of philosophy, such as the nature of reality and existence, art and beauty, ethics and the good, history and progress, and who we are. We will also use various forms of media as facilitators of philosophical questions. Throughout this examination, students will be able to develop a thematic and historical approach to the basic problems of Western philosophy. Additionally, they will learn basic critical thinking skills, including close reading and exegesis, how to engage in constructive and productive critique, how to ask good questions, how to recognize, evaluate, and make arguments, how to think through philosophical questions that are present here and now in our own lives.
